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## **Safety Precautions**

Before getting started, please read the following important safety precautions.

- 1. User should not modify any unmentioned jumper setting without Axiomtek FAE's instruction. Any modification without instructions might damage the system.
- 2. The tBOX400-510-FL does not come equipped with an operating system. An operating system must be loaded first before installing any software into the computer.
- Be sure to ground yourself to prevent static charge when installing the internal components. Use a grounding wrist strap and place all electronic components in any static-shielded devices. Most electronic components are sensitive to static electrical charge.
- 4. Disconnect the power cord from the tBOX400-510-FL before making any installation. Be sure both the system and the external devices are turned OFF. Sudden surge of power could ruin sensitive components. Make sure the tBOX400-510-FL is properly grounded.
- 5. Make sure the voltage of the power source is correct before connecting the equipment to the power outlet.
- 6. Turn OFF the system power before cleaning. Clean the system using a cloth only. Do not spray any liquid cleaner directly onto the screen.
- 7. Do not leave this equipment in an uncontrolled environment where the storage temperature is below -40°C or above 85°C. It may damage the equipment.
- 8. Do not open the system's back cover. If opening the cover for maintenance is a must, only a trained technician is allowed to do so. Integrated circuits on computer boards are sensitive to static electricity. To avoid damaging chips from electrostatic discharge, observe the following precautions:
  - Before handling a board or integrated circuit, touch an unpainted portion of the system unit chassis for a few seconds. This will help to discharge any static electricity on a human body.
  - When handling boards and components, wear a grounding wrist strap, available from most electronic component stores.

It is compatible with Windows<sup>®</sup> 10 and Linux and has been optimized for the most endurable operation. The system also features fanless design with rich I/O, supports SO-DIMM up to 32GB, and delivers enhanced system reliability by including a built-in Watchdog Timer.







▲ 24-110VDC-in railway application




▲ 24VDC-in marine application






## Rear View

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# CHAPTER 2 HARDWARE INSTALLATION

The tBOX400-510-FL is designed for easy hardware configurations, such as the HDD (Hard Disk Drive), DRAM and mini PCIe card. Chapter 2 will show you how to install the hardware.

## 2.1 Installing the Swappable HDD/SSD

Step 1 Attach a piece of Mylar on the back of an HDD/SSD as shown.



Step 2 As shown in the picture, slide the HDD/SSD into the SATA tray. Insert screws into each side of the SATA drive through the corresponding holes.




Step 3 Install the SATA drive into the slot and fasten the screw to lock the SATA drive to complete the installation.



## 2.2 Installing the DDR module and Express Mini Card

- Step 1 Make sure system power is off and unplug the power cord.
- Step 2 Turn the tBOX400-510-FL upside down, loosen the cover screws and lift the bracket a little bit as shown.






Step 3 Disconnect the four SATA connectors and remove the bracket.



Step 4 Loosen below screws to remove the cover and put the thermal pad on the slot.






Step 5 Install the DDR module with caution and put the thermal pad on the DDR module again. Then screw the DDR cover to finish the installation.



# CHAPTER 4 AMI BIOS SETUP UTILITY

This chapter provides users with detailed descriptions of how to set up basic system configuration through the AMI BIOS setup utility.

## 4.1 Starting

To enter the setup screens, follow the steps as below:

- 1. Turn on the computer and press the <Del> key immediately.
- After pressing the <Delete> key, the main BIOS setup menu displays. You can access
  other setup screens from the main BIOS setup menu, such as the Chipset and Power
  menus.



#### **Navigation Keys** 4.2







#### 4.8 Save & Exit Menu

This option allows users to operate optimized settings, customized settings and restore default settings for system configuration.



#### **Save Changes and Exit**

When you have completed the system configuration changes, select this option to leave Setup and continue start-up procedures, so the new system configuration parameters can take effect. Select Save Changes and Exit from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>. Select Ok to save changes and exit.

### **Discard Changes and Exit**

Select this option to quit Setup and continue start-up procedures without making any permanent changes to the system configuration. Select Discard Changes and Exit from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>. Select Ok to discard changes and exit.

#### **Save Changes and Reset**

When you have completed the system configuration changes, select this option to leave Setup and reboot the computer, so the new system configuration parameters can take effect. Select Save Changes and Reset from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>. Select Ok to save changes and reset.

#### **Discard Changes and Reset**

Select this option to quit Setup and reboot the computer without making any permanent changes to the system configuration. Select Discard Changes and Reset from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>. Select Ok to discard changes and reset.

#### **Save Changes**

This option allows you to save all the values and changes you set.

#### **Discard Changes**

This option allows you to abandon all the values and changes you set.

#### **Restore Defaults**

It automatically sets all Setup options to a complete set of default settings when you select this option. The Defaults settings are original BIOS settings. Select Restore Defaults from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>.

#### Save as User Defaults

Select this option to save all current Setup options as user default settings. The User Defaults settings are designed for you to set up your own requests. Select Save as User Defaults from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>.

#### **Restore User Defaults**

It automatically sets all Setup options to a complete set of user default settings when you select this option. After selecting Save as User Defaults to save your own settings, you can restore all your Setup options by selecting Restore User Defaults. Select Restore User Defaults from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>. Select Ok to restore your user default settings.

#### **Restore user Defaults**

It automatically sets all Setup options to a complete set of default settings when you select this option. The Fail-Safe settings are designed for maximum system stability, but not maximum performance. Select the Fail-Safe Setup options if your computer is experiencing system configuration problems.

Select Load Fail-Safe Defaults from the Save & Exit menu and press <Enter>. Select Ok to load Fail-Safe Defaults.

# APPENDIX A WATCHDOG TIMER

# What is Watchdog Timer

The integrated Watchdog Timer can be set up by programming. There are 1~255 levels available. After initializing Watchdog Timer by setting a countdown value, the countdown of the value will start automatically when Watchdog Timer is enabled. Watchdog Timer needs to be reset periodically or disabled, otherwise the system will reboot when the value of the timer has reached zero.



#### Sample of Watchdog application

Assume that program A must be kept running for a specified period of time:

- 1. Initialize Watchdog Timer with a countdown time value bigger than the running time of program A.
- 2. If program A has no problems when its running time has passed, Watchdog will be disabled or reset before its countdown time has reached zero.
- 3. If program A is running and experiencing any problem that can cause the system to shut down, Watchdog Timer will automatically reboot the system when countdown time has reached zero.
